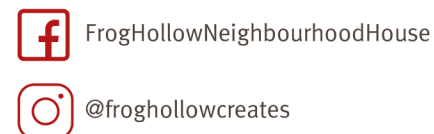

## P'IPA:M LELUM - FROG HOUSE

Clinton Park Fieldhouse, 2690 Grant St.  
Vancouver

Built through the lens of Indigenous principles and leadership, the Clinton Park Fieldhouse has become a place to honour Indigenous history, peoples and the land.

Thanks to Shane Point, a proud Musqueam artist, our fieldhouse was blessed with a Salish name: **P'ipa:m Lelum**. "**p'ipa:m**" means **frog**, and "**lelum**" means **house**

It's a place of song, of art, of nature, of connection and where we turn ideas into action.



### ALL NATIONS DRUM CIRCLE

Sing traditional songs, tell stories and learn about Indigenous teachings with Jessie Seegerts, Elders and community members from all cultures.

### ART IN THE PARK

Self-directed arts and crafts. Supplies on-site to create your own masterpiece. From beading to drawing and painting, this is a drop-in space for neighbours to take a break and engage in their creativity.

### P'IPA:M LELUM INDIGENOUS GARDEN

An Indigenous Garden embodies the perspectives and principles of Indigenous culture and teachings on this Land.

### P'IPA:M LELUM LIBRARY

A collection of books by Indigenous & BIPOC authors on various topics and for people of all ages.

## COMMUNITY ART PROJECTS

Art speaks where words are unable to explain. A series of projects featuring Indigenous artists sharing with us their wisdom and teachings, e.g. drum-making, murals, poems, etc.

## DECOLONIZATION WORKSHOPS

Start your journey of decolonizing, one dialogue at a time. Guided by Indigenous knowledge-keepers, we organize cultural competency and decolonizing training workshops for individuals and groups. To many, these workshops were transformative and life-altering.

## OUT TRIPS

Trips to local museums, events, nature & cultural tours, and educational centres to inspire learning. E.g. UBC Museum of Anthropology, National Indigenous Peoples' Day Celebration Events, Talaysay Tour @ Stanley Park, Takaya Tour @ Belcarra Regional Park, and many more.
